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## PSA TROPHIES

This booklet describes and pictures fifteen trophies\* competed for annually by the seven member schools of the Public Schools Association of Western Australia.

The PSA was formed in 1905 by the Headmasters of Christian Brothers College, Guildford Grammar School, Perth High School, and Scotch College. Wesley College was admitted to membership in December 1951, Christ Church Grammar School in October 1956, and Trinity College in 1968.

Perth High School was re-named Hale School in December 1929, and that part of CBC which moved to Mount Henry in 1938 was re-named Aquinas College.

\* Most PSA Schools have also competed in Surfing (from 1997) and Golf (from 1999). However, as these are not "Sports of the PSA" under the PSA Constitution, the trophies and a record of schools holding them are outside the scope of this booklet.

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## CHALLENGE CUP (Rowing: Head of the River)

A sterling silver cup, height 236mm, diameter at mouth 96mm, on a 144mm stepped cylindrical wooden base.

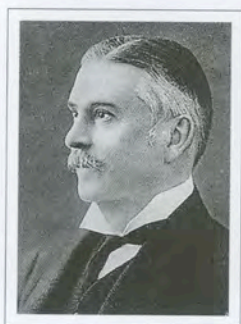

First presented in 1899, to Perth High School.

This trophy pre-dates the PSA, having been presented six times already before the Association was formed. Until 1937 the Head of the River race was rowed in Fours; from 1938 it has been rowed in Eights.

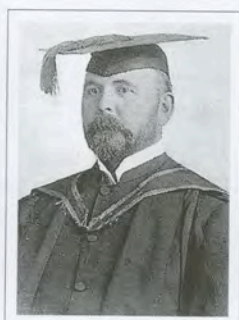
The trophy has been referred to as The Headmasters' Cup, in recognition of its having been provided by the headmasters of the four schools competing in 1899 – Christian Brothers College, Perth High School, Scotch College, and St Peter's College Fremantle.

A description of the first Head of the River race is given in S.I.Knight's *Records of Scotch College 1897-1910*:

This event took place on June 28th, the finishing line being from the Royal Perth Yacht Club landing. The club premises were placed at the disposal of the Rowing Clubs.

The course over which the several contests were rowed was a splendid one from a spectacular point, a fine view being obtained of the progress from start to finish. The officials were Messrs. Wilkinson and Muir, Captain and Secretary of the W.A. Rowing Club; Starter, Mr F. Berti; Umpire, Mr W.A. Goland. The first heat was rowed between Scotch and St. Peter's crews. The Scotch College led at the start, rowing a strong stroke. Reaching the spit beacon the cox steered widely, allowing St. Peter's to gain an advantage of one length on the inside course. The Scotch spurred gamely, but could only come within a length of St. Peter's at the finish, the latter winning after a finely contested race.

Perth High School, coached by Mr F.W. Bee, won the 2nd heat from CBC and the final from St. Peter's.



## DARLOT CUP

(Cricket)

A sterling silver cup, height 265mm, diameter at mouth 142mm, on a 160mm bell-shaped wooden base. Height with lid 355mm.

First presented in 1901, to Perth High School.

This trophy pre-dates the PSA, having been presented four times already before the Association was formed. It was originally for seasonal competition (October to March). From 1905 to 1915 the Alcock Cup, also for Cricket, was competed for by the calendar year. In 1916 when the Alcock Cup was given over to Football the seasonal competition was discontinued and the Darlot Cup became the trophy for annual competition. There are two inscriptions on the cup for 1915:

1915 (seasonal till March) – Guildford Grammar School

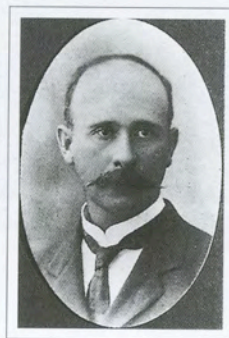
1915 (whole year) – Guildford Grammar School

### The Darlot Brothers

The cup was given by two brothers well known in Perth at the turn of the century. Everard Firebrace Darlot, MLA for Murchison 1890-1894, and his brother Leonard Hawthorn, MLA for DeGrey 1900-1901, held partnerships in a number of pastoral properties in the Pilbara and Gascoyne districts, Mingenew, and Beverley. Prominent in sporting circles, Leonard became a Life Member of the Western Australian Cricket Association. Both were members of the Weld Club for over fifty years.

# ALCOCK SHIELD

(Athletics)

A three-layered (originally single) wooden shield, height 950mm, width 870mm, with an electro-plated centre piece on which is engraved a cricketing scene.

First presented in 1905, to Guildford Grammar School.

The shield is thought to have been donated to the PSA by Alcock and Company, suppliers of all kinds of sporting goods.

Various theories have been advanced to explain the cricketing scene on this Athletics trophy. It may be simply that the most suitable trophy in stock at the time happened to have cricketers on it, and that this was not seen as unsuitable for the purpose.

The events in the 1905 programme were **Open** : Throwing the Cricket Ball, Kicking the Football, Long Jump, 220 yds, 100 yds, 440 yds, 120 yds Hurdles, One Mile, Relay Race 880 yds; **Under-16** : High Jump, 100 yds, 440 yds; **Under-14** : 100 yds, 220 yds; **Under-12** : 75 yds, 120 yds; **Old Boys** : 100 yds.



## ALCOCK CUP

(Football)

An electro-plated cup, height 360mm, diameter at mouth 188mm, on a 75mm cylindrical wooden base. Height with lid 408mm.

Inscriptions: *THE ALCOCK CUP* (Obverse)

*SECONDARY SCHOOL COMPETITION* (Reverse)

First presented in 1916, to Christian Brothers College.

The Alcock Cup has a curious history, having been presented from 1905 to 1915 for annual competition in Cricket, whereas the Darlot Cup was for seasonal competition. From 1916 the seasonal Cricket competition was discontinued, the Darlot Cup was retained for annual Cricket competition, and the Alcock Cup became the Football trophy. The previous inscriptions were obscured with a metal overlay and a new series of Football inscriptions begins with "1916 - CBC". The three cricket bats visible in pre-1916 photographs were removed from the lid, although the ball still remains.



Like the Alcock Shield, the cup was probably given by Alcock and Company, suppliers of sporting goods. A similar cup, of which a photograph appears in the 1906 issue of *Australia Junior*, is known to have been presented by Alcock & Co. to the Schools Section of the Young Australia Football League.



In 1960 this cup unofficially acquired a lid, which remained on the cup until mid-1991 when it was unofficially returned to its apparent source.



## DR K.G. TREGONNING CUP

(Swimming)

A sterling silver cup, height 260mm, diameter at mouth 120mm, on a 115mm stepped cylindrical wooden base.

### The Reverend Canon P.U. Henn, MA(Oxon)

Canon Percy Umphreville Henn was the fourth Headmaster of Guildford Grammar School, from 1910 to 1924. Prior to his donating this cup for the Swimming Competition on 3rd March 1923 Swimming had been the only PSA sport not to have its own perpetual trophy. The Latin inscription is an amalgamation of two lines from the poet Virgil with whom Canon Henn, as a Classical scholar, would have enjoyed a close acquaintance:

Scattered swimmers in the raging current  
Stretching out their arms in longing for the further bank.



### Dr K.G. Tregonning, MBE, BA, BLit, PhD

As a student at Hale School from 1936 to 1941 Ken Tregonning had an exceptional academic and sporting record. He was awarded colours in Swimming, Football and Athletics and held the position of Captain of each of these teams. Following war service as an RAAF pilot from 1942 to 1945 Dr Tregonning secured an Arts degree at Adelaide University, where he later lectured in History. After further study at Oxford and fourteen years as Raffles Professor of History at the University of Singapore he took up the headmastership of Hale School in 1967, a position which he held until his retirement in 1988.

The events in the 1923 programme were **Open** : 440 yds Freestyle, 100 yds Freestyle, 50 yds Breastroke, 50 yds Backstroke; **Under-16** : 220 yds Freestyle; **Under-15** : 100 yds Freestyle; **Under-14** : 75 yds Freestyle; **Under-13** : 50 yds Freestyle.

The name “Ray House” was added to this cup in 2003, to honour his long-standing involvement in PSA hockey.



### **Mr R.F. House, BEd, DipPhsEd, TC, GradDipBus**

Ray House joined the academic staff at Christ Church Grammar School as a Physical Education teacher in 1965. He was a Form Teacher and taught English and Maths as well as Physical Education. Five years later he began teaching Economics, a subject he continued to teach until the end of 1994.

Ray was passionate about sport. He coached the First XI Hockey Team from 1967 to 1981 and the First XI Cricket Team from 1970 until 1973. He was Master-in-Charge of Hockey for 25 years and never missed a PSA game. Highlights of his term as coach of the First XI include winning the Hockey Cup in his inaugural year and again in 1973. Nothing could have been a more fitting climax to his time at Christ Church than the First XI winning the PSA Hockey premiership in 2002, his final year at the school. As Christ Church’s delegate to the PSA between 1988 and 2002 he was instrumental in enabling more boys to be involved in PSA competition.

In the latter stages of his career Ray’s greatest contribution to the school was in the field of pastoral care. He was appointed Senior Master and Head of Pastoral Care in 1988 and Deputy Headmaster with responsibility for the day to day management of the Senior School in 1991.

## BROTHER REDMOND CUP

(Rugby)

First presented in 1963, to Scotch College.

The presence of Christ church Grammar School's name on this cup for 1961 and 1962 is explained by the following extract from the resume of a PSA Headmasters' meeting held on 13 September 1962:

Rugby Union : It was agreed that the Rugby Union trophy be named the Brother Redmond Trophy. As all schools had taken part in PSA controlled competition since 1961 it was further agreed that this trophy be engraved to show Premiership winning schools from 1961 onwards.



### **Brother M.F. Redmond, CFC, MBE**

Brother Michael Francis Redmond was born in Waverley, Sydney, and educated at Waverley College. A keen sportsman all his life he played Rugby for Waverley College 1<sup>st</sup> XV in 1906. In that year he was selected in the NSW State Schoolboys team to play Queensland.

Brother Redmond joined the Christian Brothers Order at the end of 1906 and after his period of training was sent to Dunedin, New Zealand, where his love of sport, especially Rugby, made him an integral and well accepted part of the life of the school. In 1916 he made the long trip from Dunedin to Perth and began his association with Aquinas, then Christian Brothers College, St George's Terrace. He was Sportsmaster at the College for five years before returning to New South Wales in 1941. During his time at CBC, in addition to teaching and coaching Australian Rules Football he also played Cricket regularly with CBC Old Collegians teams.

Brother Redmond returned to the College, now Aquinas at Mt Henry, as Sportsmaster in 1939 and remained there until his death forty years later. He had a gift for communicating with young people and for moulding their characters which was quite unique. They in turn held him in a regard verging upon veneration and saw him as representing the very spirit of their school.

Brother Redmond decided to give up teaching around 1970 but he never really retired. He kept on making "comebacks" when teachers were ill or in short supply, and he was always out and about the grounds meeting students and their parents. He was a well known identity at all PSA events and he and Dr Maxwell Keys of Scotch College were particularly good friends. A Christian gentleman and a schoolmaster in the great tradition, Brother Redmond loved Aquinas and the Public Schools Association, and served them all his days.

### Mr W.R. Corr

Mr Wilfred R. Corr was educated in Victoria and served with distinction with the AIF during the 1914-18 war. A major portion of Mr Corr's long life of 96 years was devoted to Tennis administration beginning in the early 1920's with the West Australian Lawn Tennis Association as Treasurer. In 1935 he was honoured with Life Membership of the WALTA.

Mr Corr became a resident member of staff at Hale School in 1942 and remained as such until 1960 when the school moved from West Perth to Wembley Downs. He had taken a keen interest in the activities of the school since the mid-1930's and was a revered teacher of Latin, Accountancy and Mathematics. He is perhaps best remembered for his understanding and help to the new and homesick boarders and for his efforts in coaching PSA Tennis and Athletics teams.

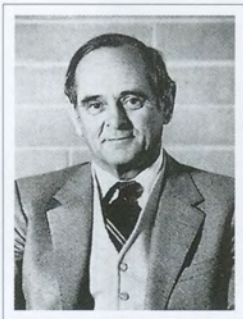

**Mr P.M. Moyes, BA, FACE**

Peter Moyes was the Headmaster of Christ Church Grammar School from 1951 until the end of 1981. Prior to his headmastership the future of the small school had been uncertain. 1951 was the turning point : the school became totally independent and with the appointment of the Council and the new Headmaster first stability was achieved, and then growth. By 1956 Christ church had sufficient pupils to qualify for membership of the Public Schools Association and Mr Peter Moyes served on the committee, along with the headmasters of the other independent schools, for the next twenty-four years until his retirement in 1981.

Mr Moyes had a special interest in Cross Country Running and trained the Christ Church long distance runners for many years.

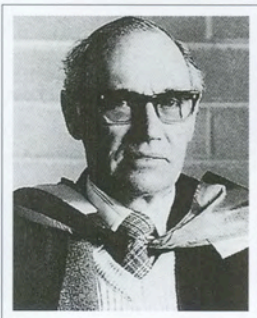

**Mr A.F. Blackwood, MC, BA, DipPhysEd, MACE**

Alan Blackwood joined the staff at Christ Church Grammar School in 1949 when the school had an enrolment of 242 boys. He was appointed Master of the Middle School in 1956 and when Christ Church joined the Public Schools Association in October of that year Mr Blackwood became a member of the Public Schools Sports Association Committee on which he served for twenty-seven years until his retirement at the end of 1983. In 1960 Mr Blackwood was appointed Senior Master at the school, the position renamed Deputy Headmaster in 1966. Alan Blackwood gave thirty-five years of valued service to Christ Church during which enrolments at the school more than quadrupled.

The following extract from the minutes of a PSA Headmasters' meeting held on 17 February 1983 is relevant :

President to purchase the C.A. Hamer cup and have Mr Hamer present the cup to the winning school. Contact to be made between President and Headmaster of Scotch for final details of presentation. Scotch College (1982) to be the first winners of the trophy.



**Mr C.A. Hamer, MA, DipEd, FACE**

The C.A. Hamer Cup commemorates the headmastership of Mr Hamer at Wesley College from 1964 to 1983.

Clive Hamer came to Wesley from Wolaroi College in Orange, New South Wales, and established a reputation for himself in Western Australia for his innovativeness in secondary curriculum (Wesley was a pilot school in the Achievement Certificate in the early 1970's) and for his uncompromising stand on appropriate standards of discipline and behaviour for young people and for the community generally. A teacher of English of sensitivity and perceptiveness, Mr Hamer taught Literature in an

enviably enlightened and enthusiastic manner.

Though not a games player Mr Hamer strongly supported the ideals of the Public Schools Association, in particular the standards of sportsmanship which the Association fostered and developed. The introduction of the Hamer Cup was an attempt on behalf of the Public Schools Association to include all crews from all schools in competition for the best Rowing school.

### Mr D.A. Lawe Davies, BSc, ASTC, FACE, Hon RSCM



David Alexander Lawe Davies, or “Taffy”, as he was affectionately known by boys and staff, was the eighth Headmaster of Guildford Grammar School. He was born in 1918, educated at Barker College in Hornsby, NSW, and commenced his teaching career in 1948 after a period of service in the RANVR between 1941 and 1946. His thirty years of schoolmastering began at Trinity Grammar School, Sydney, first as Senior Science Master and subsequently as Senior Housemaster. It was in September 1957 that he took up his appointment as Headmaster of Guildford Grammar School, a position he retained until his retirement in 1978.

David Lawe Davies was meticulous in his support of Guildford in all facets of its development, and he was fortunate that soon after his term began the school reached one of the pinnacles in its progress. However, early successes in PSA sports such as Cricket, Football and Swimming were not enough for him : he sought all-round excellence in a progressive educational environment laid on the foundations of “old fashioned” values. His encouragement of the fine arts was particularly noteworthy, and he played a prominent part in the wider affairs of Church, University, Headmasters’ Conference and the PSA, always with a view to promoting the good name and fine public image of his school.

A great deal could be said about the achievements of David Lawe Davies during his headmastership, including his sensitive dealings with staff, parents, and the wider school community. He earned the respect of Old Boys from every era and found a fond and special place for himself in the hearts of all the boys, for whom he was simply “old Taff” or “The Head”.

## DICKINSON SHIELD

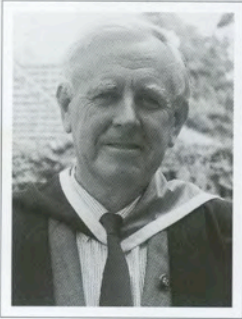
### (Water Polo)

This shield was donated in 1992 by the Western Australian Amateur Water Polo Association. It was refurbished and given the name "Dickinson" by the PSA in 2003.



#### **Mr W.R. Dickinson, AM, BSc, DipEd, FACE**

Bill Dickinson came from Melbourne Grammar in 1972 to be the Headmaster of Scotch College until his retirement in 1997. One of his most significant innovations was the early establishment of a vertical House system which facilitated a high quality of pastoral care. His detailed knowledge of boys became legendary, and he was committed to providing the best opportunities for all boys to discover and develop their individual potential, both within and beyond the classroom. The steady development of facilities assisted this process, including the provision of venues for a variety of sporting codes.

Mr Dickinson served with distinction on the councils of numerous state and national educational bodies, but always enjoyed his interaction with students, whether as a football coach for 26 years or in encouraging them in the wide range of activities in which he maintained a lively interest.

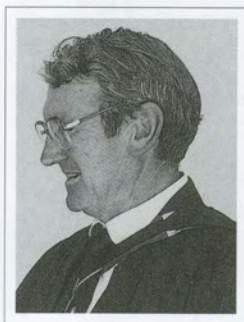
## BROTHER CARRIGG VOLLEYBALL SHIELD

A wooden shield, height 305mm, width 260mm, with a centre piece displaying a volleyball motif.

First presented in 2000, to Aquinas College.

This shield was donated in 2000 by Volleyball WA. It was refurbished and given the name "Carrigg" by the PSA in 2003.



### **Brother J.R. Carrigg, CFC, MA, MEd (Admin), FACE**

Br John Carrigg had the rare distinction of being Headmaster of a school at the time it entered the PSA competition and of being the Headmaster of two PSA schools. In 1968 he was the Headmaster of Trinity College when it was admitted to the PSA. He worked hard to upgrade facilities to enable the school to participate in all sports at all levels. From 1987 to 1993 Br Carrigg was Headmaster of Aquinas College and strongly supported Aquinas in its academic, cultural and sporting achievements.

A gifted teacher and academic, Br Carrigg completed his doctorate in Education after his retirement, and spent the years 1995 to 2003 as a full-time lecturer at Notre Dame University, WA.

This trophy was provided by the PSA in 2003, although most PSA schools have competed in badminton from 1993.



### **Brother J.A. Kelly, CFC, OAM, BA**

Br “Tony” Kelly was Headmaster of CBC, St George’s Terrace, Perth, at the time the State Government wanted the College site in order to build a major hotel for the Empire Games. He worked with the Government and the City of Perth to transfer CBC to a new site in East Perth in 1962. The College was then renamed Trinity College.

At the time of Trinity’s joining the PSA in 1968 Br Kelly, who was then a member of the Christian Brothers’ Leadership Team, oversaw the capital development that was necessary to bring Trinity College into line with the requirements of the PSA. This included the development of 14 hectares of playing fields at Manning (now Waterford). Br Kelly had a second period as Headmaster of Trinity College from 1978 to 1984.

After his retirement Br Kelly continued to teach his beloved mathematics for eleven years at Aranmore College. He is the author of several books on mathematics.

2. The Alcock Shield is the only trophy dating from the year in which the PSA was formed.
3. The PSA Football competition was conducted for eleven years before the Alcock Cup was presented, and the names of the winning schools for those years are not engraved on the cup.
4. No Football competition was held in 1919 due to the influenza pandemic.
5. The PSA Swimming Sports were conducted for eighteen years before the cup was presented, and the names of the winning schools for those years are not engraved on the cup.
6. The Challenge Cup and the Darlot Cup are engraved "Hale School" for 1925, as is the Alcock Shield for 1928, although the official change of name from Perth High School was not made until December 1929.
7. The Alcock Cup is engraved "CBC" for 1940, although the official change of name to Aquinas had been made in 1938.
8. Owing to the compulsory evacuation of Guildford Grammar School in March 1942 to allow the premises to be used as a Military Hospital, it was decided that although PSA contests would still be held when possible the results would not be recorded on the trophies. The decision did not affect the Swimming as that competition had already been held.
9. For the same reason as in 1942 (see Note 8) there was no official PSA competition in 1943.
10. The name of the winning school for 1946 (Aquinas College) is not engraved on the Swimming Cup.
11. The Swimming Sports were not held in 1954 or 1956 because of the poliomyelitis scares in those years.
